Dallas is your typical teenage boy, full of life and craves adventure and "danger"! He enjoys watching Basketball (L.A. Lakers) and Football (Green Bay Packers). Dallas likes to play guitar, video games, and VR either at home or when he is hanging out with friends. His favorite subjects

Dallas flipped in utero at 4 months and his left foot got stuck under mom's pelvis. This condition is known as Poliomyelitis. When Dallas was 1 day old, he got his first cast. Oran Pratton (Great Grandpa & a Master Mason since 1949) sponsored Dallas to be seen at the Shrine Hospital.

Dallas and family made their first trip to Shriners Children's at just 2 months old, he had a complete checkup and x-rays done. He had check ups every 6 months and had to have lifts put in his shoes to even out his stride.

Dallas had his first surgery at 9 ½ years old, in this surgery Dr. Thompkins started the leg lengthening process and placed a halo on his leg. The halo was removed 6 months later (Nov. 2018). In May of 2019 8 plates were placed in the leg to help straighten it. November 2019 the 8 plates were removed and Dallas has had yearly checkups ever since.
